

Over-Reaction to Teen's Resentment of "Damn Gay Lectures"

Charlotte Wood Middle School homosexual teacher Gary Leveque admitted in a TV newscast that he was "out" to faculty, administration, and parents.

But he (and SRVUSD administrators) over-reacted in 2001 to crude Internet postings by a 14-year-old former student, targeting the kid for adult-level condemnation. The youngster had written that Leveque should halt "these damn gay lectures," that he could "feel free to jump off[f] the Golden Gate Bridge."

At the time, Leveque denied having discussed his sexual inclinations in class — but never explained how his student came to resent "gay lectures." Leveque and East Bay members of the notorious "Gay, Lesbian, and Straight Education Network" reportedly called upon SRVUSD to begin lecturing even kindergartners about "hate speech" and "homophobia."

Like other homosexual activists, Leveque and GLSEN had an agenda that moved from "safety" and "tolerance" to affirmation and advocacy. Leveque wrote in GLSEN's newsletter (May, 2001) of desiring "to enlarge the vision" and "expand the boundaries of everyone's private world" — including that of his young students!

It wasn't surprising, then, that students also knew of his homosexuality — nor that some juvenile iconoclasts instinctually resisted SRVUSD's school-based brainwashing regarding homosexuality and its associated behaviors.

But SRVUSD responded hysterically, with a public forum as a "catharsis"; and an assistant superintendent was charged with creating a task force on "diversity." There was no mention of any classroom-content restriction imposed upon art teacher Leveque — and there was likely no such restriction.
